Now that all our kids are grown and in college or beyond, we rarely gather in this way anymore. I truly miss it, but these memories will always be special to all of us. These Havdalah gatherings really sat at the intersection of Shechuna and Shechina, neighborliness and Godliness, and for that I will eternally be grateful.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Being a Good Neighbor – Long May it Continue

We've lived in the Rockridge district of Oakland for a very long time, as have many of our neighbors. In fact, the people in the four houses directly across the street, and another neighbor three doors down, have all lived on the street for more than 45 years, and when we first moved in, we had several neighbors who were original owners, having bought their houses in the early 1920s when our street was developed. One neighbor when we arrived on the street was a very elderly woman who had come to Oakland after having survived the 1906 earthquake.

We knew before we moved in that it was a friendly street. When we went to the open house and were ready to leave, our car wouldn't start and we had to wait in front of the house for an hour for the auto club to come by. The sellers kept us company, and while we were waiting, a dozen people stopped by to ask how we were doing.

Neighbors are like family, in some ways. You don't choose them, you have to live near them, and if you don't get along, things can be unpleasant, so getting along is important. In Leviticus, we're told to love your neighbor as yourself – הַבָּהאָן דֶעַרְל רְוֹמָכ – which is not easy. Still, we and many of our neighbors try our best to look out for each other and we're very grateful that it occurs. For example, when we were away visiting our daughter and her family last October, someone smashed in the window of our car (I have no idea why since there was nothing in the car worth taking, and in fact, the thief didn't take anything at all). Our next door neighbor had been keeping a watch over the house, and she phoned us to let us know about the car window. We then were able to arrange for our younger daughter to drive to Oakland to put a car cover over the car, which occurred just hours before the intense rainstorm that hit the Bay Area on October 24th, which otherwise would have ruined the car.

Rabbi Hillel framed the same rule in the negative, "That which is hateful to you, do not do to someone else. This is the whole entire Torah; the rest is its explanation. Go and learn." That one is easier to follow. For example, when a nearby house sold many years ago, I joked that a drummer in a band was going to move in – and in fact, it turned out that the new neighbor was a drummer in a band. But he never practiced his instrument at home and instead was quiet and considerate.

Being a good neighbor also extends to our community at TBA, where we worship together, learn together, eat together, watch films and talk about books together, comfort the bereaved, and pray for restored health for those who are sick. Long may it continue.

As I write this, many Bet Sefer classes are learning about Tu B'shvat, the birthday of the trees. There are many ways to celebrate and remember this holiday, but the most popular for our children is the planting of some kind of new life.

In Mechina and Alef, the students are planting parsley for their Pesach celebrations. They decorate their pots, plant their seeds, and hopefully water their plants between now and the holiday. For those that remember to keep them alive, it's a real thrill to have something that they grew on the table. Many of them have been doing this since pre-school but the magic of watching a plant grow doesn't diminish just because you have done it before.

In Gimmel and Dalet, this year the students are planting bulbs – probably the kind that won't bloom until the summer. It's a lesson in caring for our earth, one of the best messages that we get out of the holiday.

Enjoy these pictures of our activities as we all look to brighter days ahead.

Whether you have a Bet Sefer student or not, you can plant another kind of seed to acknowledge the holiday. You can plant the seeds of stories. Find a good friend or a family member and tell them a little story about yourself that they may not know about. If your children are a bit older, they might really like hearing about your childhood (unless you have already shared everything!) If they remember the story, let them fill in what they remember. And if not, you have just nurtured your relationship a little bit by sharing some of yourself. Then ask them to do the same. With children, it is wonderful to hear how they remember family events that might be very different from your memory. You can even write down the stories you share. Then make a date to do it again. By next Tu B'Shvat you might have a treasury of stories that you have shared together, a rich memoir.

We use the word kavod or respect many times throughout the day when referring to how we treat our friends, members of our community, our classrooms, and our environment. We as educators are here to model what kavod looks like and acknowledge when we see it happening with the children. When we see a child help another we might say, "I noticed you were being very kind and helping your friend." Children often get excited when they know they've done something kind or helped someone, and they will let us know. We may respond with, "What a kindness!" We use words like 'family' and 'community' with the children when describing our Gan Avraham mishpachah. Our hope is that as the children grow up, they will understand what it means, and what it feels like to "Love thy neighbor as thyself". (Lev. 19:18).

Two For One

Saturday, April 30, Walk to Shul -- In keeping with our focus on climate change related issues, WTBA will host a Walk to Shul day. Keep an eye out for more information about meeting places to gather with other congregants that morning. We'll walk to TBA together for that morning's service.

Wednesday, June 15, Red Cross Blood Drive -- After a very successful blood drive this fall (thanks TBA!), the Red Cross will be back for another blood drive in June.

Living in alignment with the commandment "Love Thy Neighbor As Thyself" would solve nearly all of the problems our world faces today. In biblical days the Torah commanded - as an example of how to love thy neighbor as thyself - that overflow crops were to be shared. How do we love our neighbors today? Luckily, we still share excess food through community food pantries. TBA's social action committee and many other organizations are committed to help our neighbors. Individually, it's not so complicated - share what you have, be generous when you can.

A few years ago, I committed myself to helping those in need and working in direct alignment with the commandment, "Love Thy Neighbor As Thyself." I chose to address the housing crisis because so many of our neighbors' housing needs are not being met. I began Roomily, a home sharing program, based on the premise that if we share what we have in excess -- in this case, our spare rooms -- we can solve big problems. In Oakland alone, there are tens of thousands of homes that have a spare bedroom (or two), so lots and lots of extra rooms because more people are living longer and alone. I believed that by making it easier for people to find trustworthy and compatible housemates, more people would give it a try. Gladly, since starting Roomily, we have made many successful home sharing matches and we continue to help people.

What turns out to be the biggest surprise in a home sharing arrangement is that both sides, the home provider and the lodger, are each getting something and giving something, which is why it was such an appealing idea in the first place. It's a bidirectional version of "Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself" looping back and forth. How so? Renters find more affordable homes, live in the neighborhood of their choice, have shorter commutes, better quality housing, and other great benefits. Home providers can gain extra income, a sense of security, companionship, and, maybe even get a little help around the house. Communities get stronger when there's adequate housing for its vital community workers, such as educators. It turns out that with home sharing, there's a two-for-one opportunity to "Love Thy Neighbor As Thyself," that makes a better, stronger community -- just as the commandement intended.

Closest Neighbors as a Community

In the 1980s we hosted a meeting of neighbors to talk about local skills. The idea was to know skilled folks to call on when that big major earthquake hits. At that meeting we also had a Red Cross representative to discuss how best to prepare.

After the 1991 Firestorm we held a similar meeting for finding local firefighting volunteers. The idea was some of us would train, get fire hoses, and have wrenches to open our hydrants. For a short time we had firefighter support but professionals may now want to retain all control.

In both of these cases we invited our closest neighbors two to three homes down in each direction. Living on Broadway Terrace at the T-intersection of Buena Vista, that meant about a dozen homes. Perhaps it is time to reconnect with current (many new) neighbors for those community themed activities.
