

Israeli Jokes And Why There Are So Few Of Them

As I write this, we are on the verge of a ceasefire and the return of at least some of the remaining hostages kidnapped by Hamas terrorists on October 7. It has been hard to find much humor this year in being Jewish, because it has all been just so sad and scary, both in Israel and in the growth of antisemitism in the Bay Area.

For Israelis, this has almost always been the case historically. That is why the chapter about Israeli jokes in Rabbi Joseph Telushkin's book Jewish Humor, is titled "Why Are There So Few Funny Israeli Jokes." Nevertheless, here are a few of them.

How do you make a small fortune in Israel? Come with a large one.

An Israeli bus driver and a pious rabbi die on the same day. They are brought before the heavenly tribunal, and the bus driver is immediately admitted to the world-to-come. The rabbi is told to wait; his case must be examined more carefully. The rabbi is outraged: "I know for a fact that that bus driver was a totally irreligious Jew, while I gave a Talmud lesson every single day." "That is all very true," the heavenly angel tells him. "But when you taught Talmud you caused many people to sleep. When that driver drove his bus, everybody prayed."

This next one relates to the horrible double standard applied to all Israeli actions and even words.

An American, an Englishman, and an Israeli are captured by cannibals. They are each permitted one last wish before being thrown into an enormous boiling pot. The American takes off his wedding ring and gives it to the cannibal chief. "Please have this sent back to my wife." The Englishman asks permission to sing "God Save the Queen." The Israeli says to the chief. "I want you to give me a very hard kick in the rear end." The chief complies and sends the Israeli sprawling to the ground.

But when he gets up, he whips out a gun and shoots the chief dead, causing all the other cannibals to flee. The American and the Englishman are very grateful but puzzled. 

Daniel: "Why do zombies make such good workers? Because they are DEADicated!"

Kobi: "What is the pencil's favorite place?

To the moooooovies!"

Ilan: "Why is six afraid of nine? Because seven eight nine." (Almost!)

Some children recognize that there is a formula/pattern for telling jokes, but riff on the original jokes, using whatever they think of:

Maya: "What did the kitty do on the ground? Litter."

Leia followed with: "What did the kitty do on the ground? Stand on his butt. That's a funny joke."

Another way preschoolers tell "jokes" is to say something that is funny to them. No format, just silliness. (P.S. These usually get the most laughs when told in a group of peers.)

Quinn: "Why did the pigeon try to fly? Because he hurt his body."

Asher: "Baby joke. Boo boo ga ga joke."

Max: "I know a joke. Gee goo ga goo."

Reuben: "Bonky donkey!"

Rhyming is funny, and baby talk is hilarious. Also included in this category is anything with "eyeball" or "belly button" — pure comic gold!

Our adult world is full of so many serious things right now. I encourage you to think of a joke that you know, call a friend to tell them the joke, and hopefully share a laugh together. If you have young children in your life, ask if they know any jokes. Humor makes adulting a lot more bearable!

Hertz scholarship: travel money for teens to Israel

Do you have a teenager who is planning on traveling to Israel this coming spring or summer?

Students who are planning on visiting Israel this year may apply for a grant from the Hertz Fund. This is a fund that was established by the Hertz family in order to encourage our young people to travel to Israel and strengthen their intellectual and emotional connection to a place that is so important to the Jewish people.

The monetary grant is made without consideration of financial need and the money can be used for anything connected with a trip to Israel by a young person who has graduated from our Bet Sefer Religious School after having attended at least four years here and/or has celebrated a Bar or Bat Mitzvah ceremony here. Students may only be recipients of a grant one time and are eligible through age 22.

The amount of each grant will depend upon how much interest the fund has generated in the past year and how many students apply for the grant. Students may apply now for any trip to be commenced any time in 2025. In return students are REQUIRED to write an article for the Omer within one month of returning home from Israel.

If your child is planning on going to Israel this year and would like to apply for a share of the Hertz Fund, please have them email Susan@tbaoakland.org and request an application form. Applications must be postmarked no later than March 7th. We will be making awards shortly after that time.

Kramer Cooking Purim

One of the recipes I am asked for the most is a noodle kugel, a decadent dairy, baked casserole inspired by Eastern European Jewish food ways. While I have always enjoyed a good kugel (also called a noodle pudding), until recently I didn't have a recipe I was ready to share with the world until this one, developed to celebrate Purim (evening of March 12 through nightfall of March 13 this year),

Jam and Poppyseed Kugel has a just rich-enough base of cream cheese and sour cream, features dollops of sweet and tart plum and apricot jam and is sprinkled throughout with poppyseeds. It is also perfect for brunch or dessert any time.

For Purim foods with fillings (such as the jam pockets in this kugel) and or poppyseeds are traditional. Make ahead and reheating directions are at the end of the recipe.

JAM AND POPPYSEED KUGEL Serves 9

8 oz. uncooked wide-cut egg noodles, pappardelle or similar

4 Tbs. unsalted butter, melted, divided

1 cup sour cream, room temperature

8 oz. cream cheese, room temperature

1/2 cup sugar

2 large eggs, beaten

1 Tbs. lemon juice

1 tsp. vanilla

1 Tbs. plus 1 tsp. poppy seeds

1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp. salt

1 cup plum or seedless raspberry jam (see notes)

3/4 cup apricot or peach jam (see notes)

1/4 cup chopped almonds

2 tsp. minced lemon zest

Sour cream or plain yogurt, optional

Put noodles in boiling, salted water. Cook according to package directions. Heat oven to 350 degrees. While noodles are cooking prep pan and dairy base.

Brush a tablespoon or so of the melted butter on the bottom on the sides of an 8-inch by 8-inch baking dish. Set aside.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the remaining melted butter and sour cream. Cut the cream cheese into 1-inch chunks. Mash into sour cream. Mix in sugar, eggs, lemon juice, vanilla, 1 Tbs. poppy seeds, cinnamon, and salt. Mix (mashing with fork if necessary) until almost smooth.

After noodles are cooked, drain and immediately add hot noodles to the dairy base. Stir well.

Stir each jam until smooth and easy to measure (add a tsp. of water if needed). Keep separate.



Add a third of the noodles to the prepared pan. Add a third of the jams by placing them in 3 rows. Start with the plum jam, put 6-1 tablespoonsful evenly distributed in 2 rows of 3 about 1-inch from the edges of the pan. Place 3-1 tablespoonsful of the apricot jam in the center of the pan. Add another third of the noodles. Place 6-1 tablespoonsful of apricot jam in 2 outer rows. Add 3-1 tablespoonsful of the plum jam in the middle row. Add last layer of noodles and top with 2 rows of the plum jam and a center row of the apricot jam (same as with the first layer).

COOKING CONT. GALA

Place pan in middle of oven. Bake 30-40 minutes until noodles on top are golden and dairy base is bubbly and set. Let cool at least 20 minutes. Sprinkle with 1 tsp. poppy seeds, almonds and lemon zest before serving hot, warm, or at room temperature. Cut into 9 pieces. Top each with sour cream if desired.

If making in advance, do not garnish. Wrap airtight in baking pan. Refrigerate for up to 3 days or freeze for up to a month. Allow to come to room temperature. Cover baking dish with foil. Reheat in preheated 350-degree oven until heated through (about 20 minutes). If desired, remove foil once warm for a few minutes to crisp top.

Notes: Omit poppyseeds if unavailable. Choose smooth jams, preserves or fruit spreads. Use at room temperature. Taste apricot jam before using. If very tart, stir in 1/2 tsp. sugar at a time sweeten. If desired, the plum jam can be replaced by lekvar, the classic prune filling for hamantaschen. Use homemade or canned, available in many supermarkets in the baking and or kosher food section.

ONGOING SERIES: PRESIDENTS OF TEMPLE BETH ABRAHAM

Chuck Bernstein: TBA President, 1996-1997

This is the fourth profile in our series on the Presidents of Temple Beth Abraham.



Chuck Bernstein and Joanne Goldstein started coming to Friday night services at Temple Beth Abraham (TBA) when their older daughter was six months old. At the time, Friday night services were led by Isaac Sevi (z"l), a Holocaust survivor who had grown up in Salonika, Greece. Isaac incorporated Sephardic melodies that Chuck and Joanne appreciated. Everyone was very welcoming and loved having a baby in the congregation. When Isaac retired from leading the Friday night services, Chuck took on that role.

It was a past president of TBA who recruited Chuck to be President, after he had been on the TBA Board and Executive Committee for several years. Chuck recalls, "Leo Wasserman, may he rest in peace, was very active as a past president. He basically said, you need to be the next president, or words to that effect. He said, 'you know, it is time for your generation to step up.'"

The President at the time was Frank Weinberg (z"l). When Chuck was first approached, the timing was not quite right. "I told Leo and Frank that if Frank served an atypical third term that I would then become the next president. And so he did. And I did."

Chuck's older daughter became Bat Mitzvah while Chuck was President. The family wanted the Bat Mitzvah to be welcoming for TBA members. Chuck explains, "It was something that as a president, you want to feel connected to the whole community as much as possible." A large, festive kiddush lunch with dancing to a klezmer band followed services.

The evening celebration was held at the Oakland Ice Arena. The day of the Bat Mitzvah, there was a big power outage in Oakland. They were worried whether the power would come on in time, whether the ice would melt while the power was out, whether the party would happen at all. Luckily, the power was restored in time and the party was great fun, starting with Havdallah on the ice, food stations around the rink, a DJ in the stands for those who wanted to dance, and folks doing the macarena on skates.

Discovering and hiring Cantor Richard Kaplan (z"l) was the most gratifying aspect of being TBA President for Chuck. Chuck attended a Yom Hashoah observance at Temple Beth Jacob (at that time, the Yom Hashoah observance rotated among TBA, Temple Beth Jacob, and Temple Sinai). Richard chanted El Maleh Rahamim.

Chuck remembers, "We were sitting near Alan Silver. And I looked at him and I said, 'Who is that? And can we hire him?"

At the time, Richard was not ordained as a cantor. He was known as a musician who performed music from around the world. Chuck remembers, "He (Richard) started out part-time, and over time as he and the congregation came to know, appreciate and love each other, he became full-time. It was very gratifying to me to see his development from a singer to a Hazzan with kavana."

When asked about the most challenging issue Chuck faced as president, the answer is simple: money. "The synagogue always seemed short of funds for its operating needs," Chuck says. "And that was always the biggest challenge."

The Endowment Fund provided an allotment on a regular basis to the general fund, and most of that went to the Cantor's salary. Chuck talks about the challenge of setting up a dues structure. "You want people to feel welcome, but you don't want to be taken advantage of. We know of synagogues where they maybe don't really ask for tax returns, but they're fairly strict about what they think an individual should pay based on their known or perceived income. We never did that. And it's a good thing because it doesn't put pressure on the membership. It's not a good thing because you're never sure quite how much money you're going to have coming in for any given year. And you try to structure the dues in a way that the majority of people can at least pay their fair share."

Chuck credits the Treasurer at the time, Steve Kliegman, a CPA, for refining the budget development process, tracking funds, and identifying and contacting members who appeared to have the resources to make greater contributions. Two fundraising events were initiated during Chuck's tenure: Mishloach Manot, which has survived and grown over the past 29 years, and Sports Night, which is no longer but was always a family favorite activity.

Chuck's wish for the synagogue going forward is quickly stated. "I hope that it can retain the momentum that it has built with Mark Bloom's tenure."

Chuck was part of the search committee that hired Rabbi Bloom in 2001. He initially was concerned about the shiddach between TBA and Rabbi Bloom because Rabbi Bloom had not been ordained in the Conservative movement. However, the union has flourished. I just hope that when he calls it a career, we can keep the momentum going and find somebody who can pick up the baton and continue to carry it forward."
